





Environmental crime is estimated to generate as much as USD 281 billion in criminal gain each year (RHIPTO, INTERPOL,GI,2018). To move, hide and launder proceeds, wildlife traffickers exploit weaknesses in the financial sectors to facilitate further criminality which fuels corruption, threatens biodiversity and damages financial integrity. The 2020 FATF review of money laundering and IWT concluded that financial and non-financial institutions should have processes in place to identify, assess, monitor, manage and mitigate such risks. The review also recognised that identification of risks was affected by limited open-source and law enforcement information. It is recognised that the lack of publicly available data on environmental crime makes it difficult for governments and public organisations to develop effective policies to combat these crimes (UNEP,2018).

Publicly available information on seizures of illegal wildlife and forest crime is sporadic, with prosecution data difficult to obtain. EIA has developed a comprehensive database of global wildlife seizures and law enforcement action linked to ivory, pangolin, rhino horn, Asian big cats and timber. This is replicated by other international and national organisations to improve knowledge on law enforcement efforts and provide data for analysis of IWT trends. Through engagement with stakeholders however, EIA has recognised the need for organisations who collect data to share resources, preventing duplication of effort and providing an established location for data collation.

Furthermore, due to reporting biases, the use of seizures alone to analyse the scale and trends in IWT is problematic. Governments, academics, law enforcement agencies and civil society organisations (CSOs) need to be provided with the means to analyse data alongside other information sources, such as trade data and intelligence. Qualitative data on IWT intelligence is not typically available in a form that can be easily accessed or analysed alongside law enforcement outcomes.

Data held within EIA's database shows that since 2010, Vietnam has been implicated in more than 700 seizures totalling at least 123 tonnes of ivory, 111 tonnes of pangolin scales and 2.7 tonnes of rhino horn. Of these seizures, Nigeria has been implicated as the exporting country in 19 tonnes (21%) of ivory and 62 tonnes (73%) of pangolin scales, highlighting its significance in the wildlife trade from Africa to Asia. Malaysia has been linked as a transit or destination country to 309 IWT seizures from Africa and EIA intelligence indicates it plays a significant role in the transport of wildlife. EIA's work on the tiger trade has also identified Vietnam to be a persistent trade hub for tigers and their derivatives.

The volumes traded suggest that strengthening law enforcement efforts in these countries will have a significant effect on IWT networks operating between Africa and Asia. Countries should target those in the chain who are profiting the most from IWT to disrupt and deter traffickers who see the trade as a lucrative business. The financial sector needs access to relevant data to develop internal strategies to detect illicit financial flows linked to wildlife crime and identify those within the financial systems who are benefiting.

Q14. Gap in existing approaches

The project will seek to address gaps by developing the breadth and use of EIA's recently launched Global Environmental Crime Tracker. The tool provides stakeholders with access to EIA's 11,500 incident database and the use of interactive dashboards and maps to effectively analyse trends in wildlife and forest crime. EIA will aim to fill gaps in seizure, prosecution and court data, through outreach to civil society organisations (CSOs) in key IWT countries: Nigeria, Malaysia and Vietnam.

EIA's existing Media Monitoring programme, initially developed as part of a previous IWT Challenge Fund grant, provides a framework for effective information sharing with the financial sector, facilitating improved due diligence and risk monitoring. EIA partners with TRAFFIC to feed open-source data directly to banks, financial institutions and third-party data providers such as World Check. The programme was highlighted as a good example of NGO and financial sector collaboration by FATF in its 2020 report, with 10,900 entity names submitted since 2016. EIA has held initial discussions on expanding the programme to United for Wildlife(UfW) Financial Taskforce members. Due to lack of resources, the programme has been unable to expand, requiring improved technology which would be achieved through this project.

EIA's wildlife project work in Nigeria, part-funded by DEFRA IWT R7 grant, has highlighted the need for better international coordination of information between countries such as Vietnam. EIA is in contact with key government agencies such as Nigeria Customs Service and the Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit to assess needs in tackling IWT. Capacity building work has been carried out by EIA with investigators, prosecutors and the judiciary on the application of Nigeria law to wildlife trafficking cases, along with a legal review of current legislation. This project will complement this work by providing a platform to track cases in Nigeria and linked to Nigeria and provide transparency on prosecution rates.

Through a current partnership with Education for Nature Vietnam (ENV), EIA regularly shares data on wildlife cases for peer review. Through EIA's contacts in Vietnam, EIA will conduct outreach to government agencies to promote the use of the Crime Tracker in understanding trends in wildlife crime globally. Vietnam has been the subject of an ongoing review under the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) to assess Vietnam's implementation of FATF Recommendations and its framework for preventing criminal abuse of the financial system. EIA will work with United for Wildlife (UfW) to identify banks and financial institutions to join the Media Monitoring programme and improve available information to entities implicated in wildlife trafficking.

EIA's media monitoring programme has been recognised in a 2022 report by Amanda Gore for the Centre of Global Advancement. The report highlights the importance of NGOs collaborating with data aggregators to boost data on environmental offenders and encourage more law enforcement investigations. It also raises the importance of data-sharing platforms such as UfW's Taskforces to support law enforcement actions.

The project will improve the efficiency of the Media Monitoring programme through the automation of the data flow and increased capacity for additional financial institutions to receive data regularly and efficiently. Partnering with UfW to expand the programme to Financial Taskforce members, EIA will identify financial institutions significant to Nigeria,

Malaysia and Vietnam to share bad actor information with. EIA and UfW will deliver training on the use of the Global Environmental Crime Tracker and provide members with regular trend assessments and financial typologies to improve knowledge on IWT.

EIA will employ software and GIS mapping consultants to provide technical guidance on improving the dashboards and mapping tools, including adding additional data sources. EIA will conduct data research to fill gaps in court and prosecution data as well as conducting outreach and relationship building with in-country CSOs who already collate data to regularly input into the Tracker, setting up data sharing agreements where required.

EIA has identified limited CSOs monitoring wildlife crime data in Malaysia. Justice for Wildlife Malaysia (JWM) will employ a full-time Case Tracker for 12 months to collate and update cases of wildlife crime in Malaysia in order to input into EIA's Crime Tracker and provide transparency on crime and prosecution rates nationally. This data will add value to the global picture of wildlife trafficking as Malaysia is a key source and transit country. JWM will be able to produce a national record of wildlife related court cases that will assist law enforcement in producing strategies and government agencies to review policies on wildlife trafficking.

EIA regularly peer reviews its data through the sharing of data with partner NGOs, such as TRAFFIC, WCS and Oxpeckers, who will be key stakeholders in this project. EIA will use current relationships to convene a multi-stakeholder working group on the collation of open-source data to identify key obstacles in data sharing. The group will seek to put forward recommendations for collaboration on an online platform which combines current databases and tools into one location that can be easily accessible to governments, journalists and academics. The project will seek to identify a software company and obtain quotes with a view to securing further funding to achieve the desired solution. The EIA Data Manager and Data Analyst will lead on this work.

Q17. Capability and Capacity

How will you support the strengthening of capability and capacity in the project countries at organisational or individual levels, please provide details of what form this will take and the post-project value to the country.

The project will look to provide training on the use of the Crime Tracker to CSOs in the target countries so the use of the tool can assist with understanding volumes of trade in illegal wildlife and contributing to strategies on combatting IWT. Having access to mapping and analysis tools through the tracker without the need for licences will allow organisations to do their own analysis on trends and hot spots. Recruitment of a Case Tracker in Malaysia through JWM will strengthen their capacity to monitor cases of illegal wildlife nationally and track prosecution rates. The work conducted under JWM's Project Minerva assists in evaluating their capacity building programme for law enforcements agencies and prosecutors in Malaysia. JWM will produce a national record of wildlife crime court cases in Malaysia which can be used to inform national strategies on wildlife trafficking, in Malaysia and globally.

The activities under the project will strengthen the capability of financial institutions to identify illicit financial flows linked to wildlife trafficking globally. By providing banks and financial institutions with training and access to a platform of relevant wildlife trafficking cases will improve their knowledge on wildlife crime. EIA will also provide training on the tool to the Financial Intelligence Units in the target countries which will increase understanding of wildlife trafficking and assist LEAs in identifying traffickers using the financial systems and encourage investigations. The dissemination of trend assessments and red flag documents to UfW Financial Taskforce members will improve their due diligence processes and provide companies with the knowledge to design internal training programmes for financial sector staff on wildlife crime.

In line with the International Development Act (Gender Equality) 2014, EIA and the project partners are committed to ensuring gender equality and equity are promoted throughout the project.

All outreach activities will be aimed at accessing all genders working in civil society organizations with the aim of curbing wildlife and financial crime. It is recognized that there may be unequal gender representation in these organisations that result in more men benefitting from the activities and tools than women. However, we will monitor obstacles to equal

participation and address them to ensure as equal representation as possible. EIA has a range of policies to ensure gender balance amongst teams and prevent discrimination at all levels of the organisation.

EIA's research and investigations into IWT indicate that both men and women are involved in the syndicates using money laundering to finance the trade. EIA advocates for intelligence led enforcement to target the major criminals controlling wildlife crime regardless of gender.

At the community level, the reduction of illicit financial flows linked to wildlife crime through the investigation and prosecution of criminal syndicate leaders and facilitators will increase equality including gender equality through improved rule of law and good governance. By ensuring revenue is not lost more investment can also be made into services and infrastructure that equally benefit the needs of men and women and boys and girls. Since the project is not working at the community level we are not planning to collect data related to gender impacts but will report back on any unexpected benefits and monitor any unintended negative impacts that may arise related to gender from the project.

Short-term: The project will provide an improved resource through EIA's Global Environmental Crime Tracker that is available to all CSOs, governments, private sector companies, journalists and academics to increase awareness of IWT trends. Improved access to seizure and prosecution data will provide policy-makers with the information required to make informed recommendations relating to legislation in key countries across Africa and Asia.

The financial sector will have increased awareness and capacity to use AML techniques to disrupt IWT criminal syndicates through the project. Effective relationships will have been built with the UfW Financial Taskforce members to facilitate the data flow from global NGOs/CSOs and strengthen mechanisms for banks to verify new customers through KYC and due diligence checks.

CSOs and law enforcement agencies in Nigeria, Malaysia and Vietnam will have the tools available to visualise, map and analyse their seizure and prosecution data for reports and strategy development. The development and maintenance of relationships between key partners and NGOs will ensure coordinated data sharing and reduce duplication between organisations. The publication of a national record of wildlife crime cases in Malaysia will fill a gap in knowledge on the scale of trafficking in Malaysia and provide improved knowledge of trends across the entire wildlife trade chain.

Long-term: Identification of joint-partner technology solution that combines the effort of international NGOs and provides a central hub for IWT and environmental crime data will provide enhanced access to the information required for long-term legislation and policy change.

The project will lead to the identification of CSOs across other countries in Africa and Asia who have the ability to monitor wildlife trafficking and environmental crime prosecutions and who will contribute to the tracker, given resources and training. This will lead to an improved picture of wildlife trafficking globally and allow governments and policy-makers to more effectively analyse prosecution data to strengthen wildlife laws across Africa and Asia. This will encourage more law enforcement investigations and aid in successful prosecutions of wildlife traffickers globally, breaking supply routes to consumer markets.

Communities affected by wildlife trafficking include those living in and around wildlife source areas in West and Central Africa, Malaysia and Vietnam. Increased wildlife crime investigations and improved visibility of successful prosecutions will discourage criminal networks from sourcing wildlife from marginalised and underdeveloped rural areas, which will have an outcome for poverty reduction.

It will reduce overexploitation of wildlife and prevent the depletion of resources that communities would have traditionally

used for subsistence needs and provide a basis for wildlife-related development opportunities (e.g. ecotourism and protected area employment opportunities).

It will also reduce the likelihood that rural communities in source areas engage in wildlife exploitation that brings them into contact with animals of disease risk. Ivory and pangolin scale supply chains include other species that are of significant disease risk such as bats, monkeys and apes. By preventing wildlife trafficking and diminishing the benefits of poaching, this project will protect the health of people come in to contact with wildlife from zoonotic diseases.

This project will improve access to IWT resources for a range of public and private stakeholders, including financial institutions and law enforcement agencies. It will do this by expanding EIA's Crime Tracker to include additional data sources, improved analysis dashboards and mapping tools. Building relationships with CSOs in key IWT countries who are collecting seizure and prosecution records will enhance the overall picture of IWT in the country and assist in informing future strategies.

Identification within the financial sector of risks associated with illicit funds from wildlife trafficking will be improved and embedded into customer due diligence systems. This will be achieved by developing EIA's Media Monitoring programme and partnering with UfW to disseminate data to the Financial Taskforce members on a regular basis. This will lead to enhanced knowledge and awareness of IWT trends within financial institutions.

Additionally, the project will increase collaboration between NGOs collecting IWT data and identify joint working opportunities for a publicly available shared platform on wildlife crime, intelligence and conservation data.

This will lead to increased transparency and scope of information available on illegal wildlife trends, enabling more informed policy responses by governments and private sector and assisting in targeting law enforcement responses.

This project will have lasting impacts by focusing on providing key institutions with data on bad actors, effectively raising awareness of related financial flows and the need for financial investigations to curtail criminal syndicates which together with wider governmental support will lead to the systematic application of financial investigations and AML laws to counter wildlife trafficking.

The provision of trend assessments and red flag documents to private sector banks will increase the ability of their investigative and compliance departments to detect suspcious transactions and customers linked to IWT. The project will ensure that major financial institutions take steps to curtail IWT-related financial flows by embedding IWT risk assessment as a routine practice in terms of due diligence and compliance procedures.

The project addresses chronic information gaps which stymie the use of financial investigations and laws to tackle IWT by public sector agencies. Provision of an open access Crime Tracker to monitor and analyse wildlife crime globally will provide resources for government agencies to review and implement effective policies on wildlife crime.

Working with CSOs to improve data collection and recording will ensure the continued monitoring of wildlife crime in target countries and provide a national public database for use by policy makers. Identifying and implementing more effective data sharing processes by working collaboratively with international NGOs will assist in continued data collection and peer review of datasets to be used in national strategies.

This evidence project has the possibility of being able to be scaled across countries globally. Activities to improve data sharing processes and through increased automation by secure means, will enable the Media Monitoring programme to be implemented in additional countries, to additional private sector organisations and to cover additional types of environmental crime.

Throughout its duration monitoring and evaluation will be embedded in the project to ensure outputs remain on track and adaptations made where necessary as the project progresses. The M & E plan will be largely based on the project partner's

current information collation and assessment systems, with additional project-specific tools being developed. Overall responsibility for M & E will be held by the Project Leader, supported by the Data Manager and Data Analyst.

At the outset of the project a planning meeting will be held between relevant staff from EIA and partners United for Wildlife and Justice for Wildlife Malaysia to discuss roles and responsibilities, including M & E requirements, and to agree priorities for the first six months of the project. Every quarter key staff will hold a conference call to assess progress and identify potential problems with implementation. Throughout the project quarterly action plans will be created by the project partners. Development of existing work

Please provide details:

The project builds on a programme of work developed by Liberty Shared to share entity data on wildlife criminals to financial institutions to curb illicit financial flows. Liberty Shared created the programme to focus on using the existing Anti-Money Laundering (AML) framework to share information on those profiting from slavery, wildlife trafficking and environmental crimes. It made more than 15,000 submissions of profiles of individuals and entities in global criminal justice systems to partners such as Refinitiv World Check, Dow Jones Risk Compliance and to various financial institutions such as banking groups and money service providers.

EIA has been a key contributor of wildlife trafficking data to the programme since 2016 and has collaborated with Liberty Shared on a number of financial typologies. Due to a lack of funding and resources at Liberty Shared to continue the programme, EIA took over the programme in January 2021 for wildlife trafficking and environmental crimes and has continued to provide data to financial sector partners through the programme, resulting in over 750 profiles being created or updated on Refinity's World-Check database in 2021.

EIA is not aware of other projects similar to the Media Monitoring programme, which was a gap highlighted in the Centre for Global Advancements' report on data aggregators and bad actor lists.

EIA has done initial scoping and gap analysis on the need for an open access wildlife crime database and identified a number of stakeholders who have been developing solutions, including TRAFFIC's Wildlife Trade Portal and Oxpeckers' WildEye maps. Our assessment is that each organisation provides different functionality and data but that their solutions

do not provide the ability to analyse and assess trends globally. By linking EIA's Crime Tracker to the Media Monitoring programme, it presents a unique and efficient platform for sharing data to the financial sector, as well as providing an accessible online tool for governments, law enforcement agencies, NGOs, academics and the media. As an Evidence project, this work will seek to conduct more detailed gap analysis into available solutions. EIA will use existing relationships with key organisations to coordinate through a working group on seizure data and collectively identify future mechanisms for effective data sharing. As part of the working group, organisations will identify possible tech solutions for a shared wildlife crime platform.

The wide-ranging benefits resulting from increased effectiveness of public and private sector financial institutions in targeting the profits derrived from IWT, compared with the project cost, ensure that this proposal offers good value for money. By the end of the project the provision of an accessible tool for monitoring wildlife crime, plus detailed trend assessments and red flag documents, will have elevated awareness of money flows linked to IWT amongst public and private sector beneficiaries and enhanced their capabilities to appropriate action, creating a lasting legacy.

The project budget also provides value for money through alignment with current systems already created by the project partners, such as United for Wildlife's Financial Taskforce. The project will utilise information management systems and specialist software already in place at EIA, developing these through consultants to ensure the systems are as efficient and cost effective as possible through automation.

Using existing relationships and data sharing agreements with key stakeholders such as TRAFFIC, will provide comprehensive databases and peer review without additional cost. Provision of a Case Tracker in Malaysia will significantly enhance their capability to track wildlife crime in the country, which in turn will assist the understanding of wildlife trafficking along the entire trade chain.

Information generated will be managed according to EIA's internal protocols ensuring safe storage, robust analysis and compliance with data protection rules. EIA is registered with the UK's Information Commissioner's Office to hold data, is compliant with the EU General Data Protection Regulation, and adheres to UK Data Protection Act regulations. EIA has secure databases in place for the collection of sensitive data which is managed by EIA's internal intelligence team. EIA shares data under conditions which ensures that sensitive data is safeguarded. Sensitive data is sanitised before disseminated, therefore not putting individuals at risk. All staff members undergo stringent training before they can handle data. There is also an internal catalogue which holds all information which has been disseminated to other organisations, so that this can be easily monitored. EIA is also in the process of signing an Information Sharing Agreement (ISA) with TRAFFIC. This ISA will create clear guidelines for both partners on how to process, store, analyse, deal with security incidents and further disseminate data so that the data handling is in accordance to GDPR guidelines.

As this project focuses on data analysis and sharing the main ethical questions relate to how the project partners gather, store and disseminate information, especially that pertaining to individuals.

EIA has robust systems and protocols on the use of data. For example EIA is registered with the UK's Information Commissioner's Office, including a journalistic derogation to hold data on individuals in the public interest. EIA is also compliant with the provisions of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

In terms of its media monitoring programme EIA adheres to standards comparable to those of third-party due diligence service providers i.e. names of individuals shared from open source media searches can only include names of individuals charged with wildlife crime offences and where the full name of the individual is known. These measures ensure that the rights and privacy of individuals impacted by the project are protected.
