1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – September) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end of September).

Project IWTEX004 was approved in June 2024, with formal acceptance of the grant in August 2024. The project officially commenced on 01 September 2024.

During the initial phase, our government partners in the 5 target countries were notified by letter of the successful grant award and the project's launch, reaffirming the project's aims, strategic objectives, and specific activities. These communications also included a formal request to nominate a Focal Point for the project to assist with project planning, coordination, and implementation. Since notifying the governments, the process of nominating Focal Points has commenced, and the EPIF is now actively collaborating with the Local Partners on workplans and the immediate next steps to commence the initial activities of the project. Preliminary planning calls have been held or are arranged in the coming days with Sierra Leone, Burkina Faso, Togo and Guinea. For Liberia, EPIF is still awaiting the appointment of a government Focal Point, but is engaging proactively with contacts within the department to expediate this process.

Dates have been proposed to all five countries for initial visits to conduct Baseline Gold Standards assessments and project planning, with the aim being to complete all of these visits before the end of 2024. Currently we are still awaiting confirmation from all governments but continue to engage with our Focal Points to enable visit planning and coordination as soon as possible. Once these visits are conducted, a detailed workplan will be agreed with governments and Local Partners to deliver all project activities within required timelines.

In addition, the relevant Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Offices (FCDOs) for each of the five target countries were informed by letter about the project funding being awarded. The EPIF held a call with the Ambassador to Guinea and have had productive communications with the Embassy in Liberia. We have not yet had responses from the High Commissions in Sierra Leone or Ghana (for Burkina Faso and Togo). We will continue to keep all FCDOs informed at regular intervals as the project progresses and include visits to Embassies / High Commissions during our initial assessment visits in the target countries, which has already been agreed with Guinea and Liberia.

The tempo of the early phases of the project has been dictated by the speed of response and selection of Focal Points by the government partners. This has taken more than four weeks in most cases. This is not something that the EPIF can directly influence, but have we used persistent communications and engagement with stakeholders to enable the preliminary project activity to commence. As above, in Liberia this has still not been resolved, but it is assessed this is due to a change in senior management within the FDA and should be resolved shortly. In all target countries this early delay might impact our aim of completing all initial assessments visits before the end of 2024, but it is still hoped this will be possible. Any that are not completed will be prioritised in early 2025.

Feedback from Initial Approval Letter: 'It was noted that the mitigating actions for the risk in line 40 of the risk register "All countries – SEAH" could be strengthened by ensuring all staff receive Sexual Exploitation, Abuse and Harassment (SEAH) training and that there are regular monitoring of Complaints, Feedback and Response Mechanisms, and that these are included as mitigating actions.'		

Measures to address the above feedback have been included in project planning. We will ensure the training audience receives Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) training as part of this project, by using the disasterready.org free PSEA course that all EPIF employees are mandated to complete already. We will make this a mandatory online precourse requirement for all participants, staff and partners.

The EPIF has recently reviewed its Complaints, Feedback and Response Mechanism policy and will communicate the available channels for all staff, participants and partners to report any incidents for confidential and sensitive response from our management team. This has been updated in the risk register.
