Output Indicators

1.1) Number of SMART patrol units supported and conduct monthly patrolling (baseline= 1 units, by Y2=2 active units, Y3= 3 active units

2 units of SMART patrol were established during April - September 2023, and have carried out patrols four times as well as monitoring illegal and legal activities in April - August 2023 within Karimata Marine Reserve Area

1.2) Number of community members enrolled in SMART patrols and trained in SMART (baseline= 10 members, Y1= 20 members, Y2= 30 members, Y3= 30 members)

to date, 25 people from Village of Betok and Village of Padang been trained in SMART patrol methods and have remained enrolled as active patrol members (as of September 2023)

1.3) Quarterly and annual reports on trends in illegal and legal behaviour across sites and annual evaluations of SMART patrol with patrol members and government

After the revision of the Program Work Plan (PWP) with the government management authority, and its approval in April 2023, we have conducted two data review sessions with the

government offices to better share data and support the government to make management decisions rooted in evidence3

1.4) % of Karimata coastal areas protected and patrolled regularly by SMART patrols (baseline = 0%, Y1=20%, Y2=30%, Y=40%) [IWT-B09]

65,851.73 Ha or 34,48% of the Marine Nature Reserve total area (191,000 ha) has been patrolled by SMART teams during April-August 2023. No patrol was held in May due to the large waves and safety concerns In September, patrol members moved beyond the beginner course to intermediate course, therefore, no patrol was conducted in September as the members were receiving training.

1.5) Number of government officials trained and enrolled in SMART patrols (baseline= 0 members, Y1= 4 members, Y2= 8 members, Y3= 10 members)

3 people from BKSDA SKW I Ketapang and 2 Village Officers from Betok and Padang have been trained on SMART Patrol Evaluation and Intermediate Training 20 - 21 September 2023 in Ketapang. The 5 trained government officials have been enrolled and added to the Karimata SMART Patrol team.

2.1) Number of community members trained and enrolled in sea turtle monitoring teams [IWTCF-D02]

11 people (all men) from Betok Village were trained on the Sea Turtle Nesting Beach Monitoring and protection survey on 25 - 27 August 2023. The same training for Padang Village will be in mid November 2023

3.1) Number of new members enrolled in CCs in Karimata marine reserve annually (baseline value=81, Y1=250, Y2=500, Y3= 750 total=750; 40% of beneficiaries are women)

169 people (73 women, 96 men) have been enrolled in 4 CCs (community governance institutions) in Karimata marine reserve with 43% of the beneficiaries being women, as in following details: Betok-44 (30 women, 14 men); Klumpang-29 (14 women, 15 men); Sungai Abon-33 (18 women, 15 men); Tanjung Ruu-61 (11 women, 50 men).

3.2) % growth annually in Karimata Village Savings & Loan program (baseline=£250, +30% growth annually Y1,Y2,Y3)

Between April to September 2023, the value of savings for the four CCs' members in Betok Jaya and Padang Villages has increased by 30.6% with a total savings up to April was IDR. 36,730,000, and the total savings up to September 2023 was IDR. 47,970,000. There is no calculation for loan growth, for the CCs haven't provided loans yet as in agreement with the community-determined standard operating procedure to grow group assets before initiating loans.

3.3) CC vision and mission building, memberships rules, elections, and standard operating procedures [IWTCFA03]

4 CCs (CC Betok Mensiban Jaya, Teluk Mewah Klumpang, Putri Permata Gemuruh, and Sungai Abon Sejahtera) in Karimata were established and have developed clear vision, mission, membership rules and governance rules

3.4) >90% loan repayment rate from cooperative members (Y1, Y2, Y3) and >97% repayment rate for women

Formed CCs have not yet launched Loan service. The loan facility will be launched once the CC is established and ready, generally after one year of establishment. The CCs' management planned in November 2023.

- 5 CCs sub working groups namely Working Groups of Literacy, SMART Patrol, Sustainable Fisheries, Community Finance, and Healthy Family have been created and supported CCs programme activities
- 3.6) 3 new commodities and income generating activities identified and supported annually in both target areas (baseline=0, Y1=3, Y2=6, Y3=9)
- 3 new commodities (squid,mackerel and sea cucumber) identified as potent go income generating activities
- **3.7) Asset transfers to CCs to generate income and identify new livelihood sources will commence after individual loan and group loan mechanisms are active**

- 210 households or 500 people (100% women) have been reached by health-environment programme

- 21 individuals (100% women) have been enrolled, recruited, and trained as health ambassadors
- 4.3) Number of beneficiaries reached by literacy program by end of year 3 baseline=0, Y2=100, Y3=200) [IWTCF-D10]
- 66 people from Padang and Betok has been registered into our literacy programme through Equivalence Education Package Programme (Package A equivalent to Primary School, Package B equivalent to Junior High School, and Package C equivalent to Senior High School) with following details: Package A-21 (13 women, 8 men); Package B-19 (9 women, 10 men); Package C-23 (18 women, 5 men)
- 4.4) Compile health reports on a quarterly and annual basis and provide them to government clinics and public health departments.
- 1 annual health report draft is in progress and will be provided to the government clinic in November 2023. No quarterly report, the Government Clinic/PUSKESMAS head has stated no need to provide one.
- 4.5) Participatory impact assessment conducted every 2 years to support participation in identifying ALL program outcomes and impacts (relevant to all outputs)

- 8 people from partner villages (Betok-5 people; Padang-3 people) has been enrolled in fisheries monitoring team

In both Padang and Betok Jaya Villages, we learned about the complex relationship between the communities living in Karimata marine reserve and the government agencies responsible for managing it (sea tenure system) affects our approach and strategy in programme implementation, which is more flexible (adaptive management) and give more time to coordinate with many local stakeholders. The communities feel under strict control of strict marine reserve regulation and felt it brought them marginalised in terms of access to natural sea resources that were supposed to be utilised to support their livelihoods and that they have been practising the (fisheries) management for a long time. This makes the fisheries management planning a delicate issue. Furthermore, there is still a lack of understanding and awareness regarding the marine reserve zonations and rules, requiring more work to be done in this area.
