The project started on July 1, 2022. Progress on activities was made during this reporting period, as outlined below against each activity and the timeline agreed upon in December 2023 (Annex 1).

Output 1: Behavioural change strategy developed for reducing the demand for TFTs based on improved understanding of market dynamics and consumer motivations.

Activity 1.1: Media search and data analysis to identify TFT consumption and trade hotpots and continue monitoring of seizures.

Media data collection continued from April 1, 2024, to September 31, 2024. During this period five incidents of illegal TFT trading were recorded, involving 376 animals, all of which were confiscated alive (Table 1).

Activity 1.2: TFT market surveys.

No market surveys were scheduled for this reporting period. We completed the first round of surveys in Y1 and conducted a second survey in Year 2 to see if and how things had changed since the first survey (see Year 2 Annual Report).

Activity 1.3: Develop and finalise map of TFT consumption and trade hotspots and consult with key stakeholders.

Activity 1.10: Repeat market surveys throughout project to monitor any drop in size of market to support indication of reduced demand.

Market surveys were conducted in Year 1 and Year 2. Additional surveys will be conducted in Year 4 Q3.

Output 2: Behaviour change strategy implemented resulting in measurable changes to knowledge, attitudes and practices of TFT consumers, and lessons learned to improve future campaigns.

Activity 2.1: Develop awareness raising key messages and materials.

We have produced various TFT awareness materials, including posters, flyers, booklets, stickers, t-shirts, and fridge magnets (Annex 2 to Annex 8) both in English and Bangla languages. We were on track to complete the development of materials in the last 3 months, but piloting/testing of these materials was postponed due to political unrest across

the country and the subsequent change in the ruling government. Following the protests governance weakened significantly, and large gatherings were discouraged. This has impacted the planned awareness raising events, film showings, and the distribution of materials to local community members.

Activity 2.2: Documentary film on reducing TFT consumption.

The TFT documentary film production is complete and ready for the showings as part of the awareness raising events planned under the behaviour change campaign (Annex 9). The events are being rescheduled for Y3Q3 as a result of the recent political unrest.

Activity 2.3: Design TFT consumer demand reduction campaign.

The demand reduction campaign has been designed and is ready for initial piloting to test the messages and materials. This was initially planned for Y3Q1 but has now been rescheduled to Y3Q3 due to the unexpected political unrest. A revised project timeline has been drafted (Annex 9) and submitted with this half-yearly report. Given the remaining time in the project and the impact of the political unrest, we will be submitting a change request for the project to reschedule the demand reduction campaign from Y3Q3 to Y4Q1 and Y4Q2. *Activity 2.4: Execute campaign in identified TFT consumption and trade hotspots.*

Based on the baseline KAP study results and TFT market survey findings, we have identified key hotspots for TFT consumption and trade: Khulna, Gopalganj, Madaripur, and Satkhira districts. These locations will be the focus of the behaviour change pilot campaign activities. As noted above the execution of the pilot campaign has been delayed to Y3Q3.

Activity 2.5: Organize and hold two journalist training workshops.

Activity 2.6: Conduct post-KAP surveys in the areas where TFT demand reduction campaign took place.

This activity was originally planned to be completed by Y2Q4; however, due to delays in the roll out of the campaign, the survey has also been postponed. We now expect to conduct the mid-term KAP survey in Y3Q4 following the pilot demand reduction campaign in Y3Q3. Post-campaign KAP surveys will be rescheduled for Y3Q4 and then be helped after the rollout of the full campaign in Y4Q1 and Y4Q2

Output 3: Establish collaboration for behaviour change for TFTs through sharing of the approach between wildlife managers, law enforcement officials and development agencies in Bangladesh and India on successes and failures in demand reduction.

Activity 3.1: Organise two virtual meetings between India and Bangladesh. Activity completed in Y2. See Y2 Annual Report.

Activity 3.2: Organise an in-person workshop at Bana Bhaban in Bangladesh with participation by forest officials from Bangladesh and India.

This activity was initially planned for in Y3Q1. It was delayed from Y3Q1 due to national elections in India, and Indian government staff were unable to travel at this time. The activity was then rescheduled to Y3Q2. The political unrest in Bangladesh has complicated this activity significantly as the former Bangladesh Prime Minister fled the country and took shelter in India. The Indian Government has subsequently restricted visas for Bangladeshis, and political ties with the interim government are yet to be established. We will continue to monitor the situation but based on the current conditions and the length of time needed for approvals and visas this activity will likely need to be cancelled. We will explore options for sharing the lessons learned from this project and continued transboundary dialogue on this issue between India and Bangladesh. We will submit a change request including a financial change to the project.

Activity 3.3: Organise an in-person workshop at Aranya Bhaban in India with participation by forest officials from Bangladesh and India.

This activity was planned for Y3Q4. However, based on the current political situation and relationship with the government of India and the interim government of Bangladesh, we do not believe this activity will be possible in the timeline of this project and will propose to cancel this activity. We will submit a change request including financial changes to remove this activity from the project. WCS will continue to monitor the situation and identify potential options for virtual exchanges between the relevant authorities in each country and other organisations who would benefit from sharing the work undertaken through this project.

Activity 3.4: Distribute summary report on socio-economic drivers of involvement in illegal trade and consumption with stakeholders including development agencies.

Output 4: Bangladesh's national wildlife protection laws strengthened for TFT protection.

Activity 4.1: Prepare background document and draft proposal for listing all the threatened TFT species under the Wildlife Act, 2012.

We prepared and submitted the proposal for listing all threatened TFT species under the Wildlife Act in Year 1. WCS continues to follow up with the BFD to check on progress in reviewing the document and moving it forward to the next step. BFD has conducted three separate meetings on this, and the draft has been sent to the ministry for review.

Activity 4.2: Prepare a proposal to clarify definitions of Schedule I and II protected species in the Wildlife Act, 2012.

We completed this activity in Year 1, with the proposal to clarify definitions submitted to BFD. We continue to follow up with BFD on the progress of the Wildlife Act amendment. BFD already conducted three separate meetings on this, and a draft has been sent to the ministry for review.

Activity 4.3: Follow-up meetings and engagement with BFD on proposals to list threatened TFT species and clarify definitions of Schedule I and II protected species in the Wildlife Act, 2012.

This activity is making progress as planned. Our WCS Legal Advisor is in touch with both the BFD and the ministry to push the draft proposal towards finalizing it.

Activity 4.4: Prepare a proposal to add regulatory directives from the Wildlife Act, 2012 to the Import Policy Order under the Imports and Exports (Control) Act, 1950 and submit it to Customs.

Activity 4.5: Follow-up with Customs Agency through meetings and engagement on the proposal.

Several phone calls were made with Customs officials through personal communications led by our WCS Legal Advisor and two meetings were held with them during this reporting period aiming to amend the Import Policy Order under the Imports and Exports (Control) Act, 1950.

2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments/lessons learnt that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. Explain what impact these could have on the project and whether the changes will affect the budget and timetable of project activities.

The project progressed as planned until Y3Q1. During Y3Q2 political unrest erupted in Bangladesh in July 2024 due to nationwide student-civilian protests. The protests and the government's counter-response resulted in unstable conditions across the country and political regime change. Hindu communities became vulnerable to Muslim fundamentalists. An interim government is now in charge. During the period of unrest travel was restricted for staff safety and the ability to implement activities was impacted. Since then, organizing large public gatherings and open events has been highly sensitive. Our TFT demand reduction campaign requires mass public gatherings, especially in Hindu communities. Given the current situation, we have been unable to conduct such events, and we are currently unsure when this will be possible. This situation continues to cause delays in implementation. As the political situation improves, we anticipate that we will be able to complete piloting of the campaign by Y3Q3 and Y3Q4. This situation will potentially impact both the budget and timetable of project activities. Delays in piloting the campaign will impact the implementation of the main TFT demand reduction campaign. The project timetable will be adjusted to accommodate the current political climate and delays to project activities. In addition to impacts on the campaign, at this point, the cross-border meeting with India has also been cancelled due to a current lack of political willingness from both India and Bangladesh. A revised project activity timeline has been drafted (Annex 10) and a formal Change

Request will be submitted to update the timeline along with a financial change request. An updated risk registrar is also added with this report (Annex 11).

The feedback from the Year 2 annual report was received and well noted. The feedback included two questions requesting further details and clarification.

Clarification on the demand reduction strategy and model – is this part of the same document or will a separate one be developed for the model?

The demand reduction strategy (see Annual Report Year 2) and model are part of the same document. The strategy has been finalized up to the point of the piloting of the approaches. Once the initial pilot has been completed, a simplified visualization of the behaviour change model will be added and the strategy will be refined further to incorporate some modifications based on the results of piloting of the campaign and the results of the Knowledge, Attitudes, and Practices (KAP) survey on the pilot campaign. The current version of the strategy and model have been attached to this report.

Further develop the strengthening of the exit strategy with clear objectives and actions for how to achieve them.

To strengthen the exit strategy, the project will focus on creating sustained changes in consumer behaviours through a comprehensive demand reduction campaign, including films, community radio programs, exhibitions, and various awareness materials such as posters, booklets, stickers, fridge magnets, t-shirts, and leaflets. This campaign will serve as a replicable model for other regions and species. We will build local capacity through journalist training, mentoring Hindu religious leaders, and encouraging local ownership through turtle guardians, ensuring sustainability. Additionally, we have started advocacy for legal reforms to protect TFT species and support enforcement efforts. These actions aim to extend the project's positive conservation impacts beyond its duration and benefit other globally threatened and CITES-protected species. Furthermore, the project team has secured a three-year grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to continue the extended TFT behavior change campaign in other identified TFT consumption hotspots during Y4 of this project.
