- **Activity 1.9:** LU to host 2 in-person workshops of CLAW partners, to discuss project start, case resources and frameworks, and then case develop development and strategy The first in-person workshop was held from 4-9 Sept. 2023. The second workshop is currently being planned with dates confirmed for 3-7 February 2025.
- **Activity 2.1:** Cooperation with lawyers in 7 countries, LaW will conduct legal analysis about how CL can be operationalised in each country, following the CL checklist we have developed/trialled in 4 countries.

We have completed this analysis for all countries..

- Activity 2.2: ICEL, LAGA, WTI and LaW will host technical workshops in 7 countries with legal experts to refine the checklist and consider socio-legal realities of strategic litigation Workshops have been held in India, Indonesia, Cameroon, Uganda, and the Philippines. The Brazil workshop is being planned. The Mexico workshop is being planned for early 2025.
- **Activity 2.3:** Publish 7 country-specific reports and "In Brief" summaries that synthesise CL laws and procedures, for dissemination via website, social media, CoP, network and events Reports and In Brief summaries are published for Cameroon and Indonesia. The Thai language and Bahasa-Indonesian language reports have been recently published (in addition to the English versions already up). The Uganda reports and in-brief are released, and the Philippines report is in the final lay-out stage.
- **Activity 2.4:** All partners will develop resource on "lessons learned about strategic conservation litigation", based on a virtual workshop and discussions with partners and CoP. Published online.
- **Activity 2.5:** LaW will develop online, free database (e.g., using Google) to populate with cases contributed by WTI, ICEL, LAGA, CoP and in-country lawyers across >7 countries This database has been completed, and is currently being formatted for publication as an online database.
- Activity 2.8: LU, LaW and DLA to develop draft "model legislation" text, to guide countries that are reforming their legislation and want to strengthen CL. Disseminate this to targeted legal experts in countries where reform is ongoing (e.g., Indonesia, Liberia, Zambia, Zimbabwe, EU) The text of the model legislation is under development and scheduled to be completed by early 2025. As part of this, CL was engaged in the Model Forest Act Initiative (MoFAI) initiative held in Indonesia in July 2024, which provides a new pathway for the resource to be used.
- **Activity 2.9:** LU and LaW to develop regular online posts, with contributions from WTI, LAGA, ICEL, and disseminate via website, CoP, network and social media CL continues to use LinkedIn to share news and updates, and to engage with our community, along with our partner contributions.
- Activity 2.10: LU to organise partner roles for public communications (blogs, website updates), and maintain/develop database of media contacts to coordinate maximum visibility for cases CL has developed a list of 7 priority international media contacts that we will reach out to as our cases become public. We also have blog contributions from 2 of the partners. The website and social media are actively maintained.
- Activity 2.11: LU to lead partners in co-authorship of blogs/editorials, website updates, and 2 key academic publications via collaborative GoogleDocs
 Since our 2023-24 annual report, 9 additional blogs/editorials have been added to our website. We have 2 journal manuscripts in process, one has been invited for submission to Nature Sustainability.
- **Activity 2.12:** LU and LaW to disseminate new resources (above) via website, social and print media, CoP, network mailing list, and in-person and virtual workshops, IWTCF newsletter

Our new resources have been shared with our community of practice through WhatsApp, emails, our new newsletters, and social media. Activity 4.4: Partners and in-country lawyers identify the most appropriate prospective future plaintiffs, and help organise virtual meeting with LU/LaW Baseline legal analyses required to do this outreach have been completed, and we are working with our partners and in-country lawyers to identify future plaintiffs, new ones of which are likely in Uganda, Liberia and the Philippines (i.e. beyond those identified in the original project). Activity 4.5: ELI and LU to lever international and partners' networks co-host open virtual events for law practitioners globally The first of these international workshops/webinars was held on 29 May 2024, titled "Rights of Nature: Taking Action When Nature is Harmed" and the speakers were: Gerthie Mayo-Anda, Blair Atwebembeire, Philippe Cullet, Maribel Rodriguez, and Yaffa Epstein. This webinar was well attended (79 attendees). The second workshop is scheduled for 15 October 2024, titled "Climate Litigation is Also About Biodiversity" and the speakers were: Joana Setzer, Margherita Cornaglia and Rika Fajrini. 2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments/lessons learnt that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. There are ongoing challenges with getting cases formally filed, especially because we are trying to work via government agencies (i.e. because of security concerns, and to build sustainability/mainstreaming), and this places the filing of cases outside of our immediate control. For example, the case in Indonesia is entirely developed and the project has invested heavily into it, but the current change of government administration and structures (the Ministry of Environment and Forestry is being separated), means that the case has still not been officially filed. 3. While litigation can potentially create "incentives" for actors to comply with regulations, in the context of these cases for IWT, this is not a primary/priority change pathway. You should consider how the penalties given in successful cases are actually followed through and reduce harm as anticipated. This may be beyond the timeline of the project, but such monitoring would ensure the litigation results in the proper Outcomes. We strongly agree this is important. It is, in part, addressed by filing cases that include timelines and proposals that the judge request ongoing monitoring of implementation by the state, i.e. to ensure results. Beyond that, we definitely plan to independently monitor cases beyond the project time horizon, through to implementation of any remedies.
