**Indicator 1.2** establish new Conservation Litigation Network, engaging >200 student/junior and >50 practising lawyers with CL concepts across >7 countries, including through student "law clinic" volunteers helping with cases; presentations within undergraduate law modules in >3 countries, 2 virtual global workshops targeting legal practitioners, scientists and potential plaintiffs

- This work was presented by partner, ICEL, at the 5th ASEAN Environmental Law Conference (AELC) "Advancing Regional Commitments for Environmental Justice through Legal Approaches" in Bali, Indonesia, July 7–9, 2025. This work was one of the topics in the biodiversity parallel session. Difa Shafira (ICEL) presented the significance of urgent application of liability litigation, opportunities in Indonesia's legal context, and framework to craft innovative remedies.
- An e-poster "Conservation-Litigation: A radical legal approach to save biodiversity" was submitted to the IUCN World Conservation Congress being held in Abu Dhabi in October 2025.

**Activity 1.6** ICEL and WTI to announce "law clinic" opportunities for law students, and recruit >6 students to support case development (e.g., legal research, preparing documents)  
WTI has a student from Jamia Millia University working to identify cases for compensation. The student is also working on damage claims.

**Activity 1.7** ICEL, LAGA, WTI, LU, LaW present strategic conservation litigation to undergraduate law modules in >3 countries via the partners

ICEL has submitted its proposed curriculum incorporating this work to Universitas Riau, and is awaiting the finalized version.

ICEL has integrated this material into the *Kapita Selekta Hukum Pidana* (Selected Topics in Criminal Law) course at University of Indonesia. The session will be delivered by Marsya Mutmainah Handayani, an ICEL researcher, during the fourth week of October.

**Indicator 2.1** Legal report and "In Brief" summaries resource published for 7 countries (Indonesia, India, Cameroon, Mexico, Brazil, Philippines, Uganda)

Pending reports for India and Mexico are well on their way for publication by the end of 2025-26. The workshop in Mexico was held in September 2025. India's report is in final revision.

**Activity 2.11** LU to lead partners in co-authorship of blogs/editorials, website updates, and 2 key academic publications via collaborative GoogleDocs

"How legal actions can help reimagine relationships with nature" was submitted to the CEESP Reimagining Relationships Chapter in May 2025

**Indicator 3.2** Minimum of 3 cases submitted in courts, at least one in each India, Indonesia and Cameroon

Damage claims for future cases involving chimpanzee IWT in Cameroon were approved by the Ministry. The damage claim for the elephant case in India has been presented to the government team preparing the case. Legal processes remain slow, but CLAW local partners are actively working on filing cases as soon as possible

**Indicator 4.1** partners host in-person workshops for practitioners in the 2 core countries (India, Indonesia), and LaW and LU host virtual workshops in the 4 additional countries (Philippines, Brazil, Mexico, Uganda). These will introduce CL and recruit future plaintiffs

- A workshop was held in conjunction with the UK embassy in The Philippines in May 2025. The workshop launched the Philippines report and introduced CL and remedies to other lawyers in The Philippines.
- A presentation was held by Greenhood Nepal in July 2025 discussing a new case in Nepal involving remedies.

- In July 2025, a Workshop on 'Convictions & Compensatory Measures in Wildlife Crime Cases' was held by WTI in Meghalaya, India.

In addition to this progress, in Sept. 2025 we have incorporated [Conservation-Litigation.org](#) (CL.org) as a non-profit, charitable organisation based in the Netherlands. This line of work has operated for several years, led by the PI, Jacob Phelps, as a stand-alone project run out of Lancaster University – predominantly funded by IWTCF. It is now maturing into its own organisation, as it expands beyond the scope of what is possible and effective as a University-run project.

**2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments/lessons learnt that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. Explain what impact these could have on the project and whether the changes will affect the budget and timetable of project activities.**

Law and Wildlife (LaW), a significant partner in this project, had to shut down as an organisation due to the health of the founder. This resulted in delays of some deliverables, and the need for an appropriate channel for the other LaW employees to remain involved in and paid by this project. The deliverables are on track to be completed by the end of this project. As part of the longer-term plans of this project, CL.org incorporated as a non-profit. With CL.org established as an entity, they were able to take on the LaW staff to ensure continuous coverage in the project, and payment.
